




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WELCOME TO A WATER LOVER'S PARADISE!

n angler, boater, and water-lover's paradise awaits you in Sebring and the surrounding areas located in South Central Florida.

With more than 100 nearby lakes, Sebring offers some of the best lakes and creeks for fishing, water skiing, kayaking, canoeing, swimming, scuba diving, and recreation that allows you to enjoy

the beauty and serenity many people have come to appreciate in this area. (For more information about outdoor recreation on land, please request a copy of our Nature Brochure.)

Sebring, and the surrounding cities of Avon Park, Lake Placid and Lorida, is centrally located in the heart of Florida just 60 minutes south of Disney World and no more than a few hours from most of Florida's major cities. Great fishing and easy access is readily available during the spring, summer, fall, and winter. Every facility imaginable is available for your use.

Fishing guide services, information hotlines, public boat launches, parking areas, fishing piers, marinas, boat rentals, fish-cleaning stations, campsites, motels, restaurants, bait and tackle shops, and more are available to help make your fishing trip memorable!





The County's Parks & Natural Resources Department maintains more than 40 public boat ramps. In addition, each city (Avon Park, Lake Placid, Lorida, and Sebring) also maintains public facilities to access and enjoy our refreshing waters.

SPOTLIGHT ON SOME AREA LAKES...

Lake Denton is a 66-acre freshwater lake that is known for its clarity and visibility. Located between Avon Park and Sebring, Lake Denton's maximum depth is 51 feet. The lake has a public boat ramp and parking area.

At nearly 28,000 acres, **Lake Istokpoga** is the fifth largest lake in Florida. Anglers from all over the state and nation come to the area to fish at this lake, which features four public and several private launch ramps. Lake Istokpoga is ranked as one of the best bass lakes in the Southeast by Bassmasters, and it is #1 in the state for 10+ pound bass.

Lake Jackson is the centerpiece of Sebring. At approximately 25 feet at its deepest, most of the lake is just 9-16 feet deep. The water is clear and the shores are sandy. The lake has one boat ramp at Veterans Beach on the lake's west side. The city of Sebring maintains four public swimming beaches at Veterans Beach, City Pier Beach, Crescent Beach, and Hidden Beach. Leisure boating, water sports, skiing, and fishing are popular activities on the lake, and a public fishing dock is located at the City Pier Beach.

Lake Placid's Lake June-in-Winter is the county's second largest lake at 3,504 acres. It is the largest of the ridge lakes, and is frequented by boaters, swimmers, and fishing anglers. More than 800 acres on the west shore of the lake is preserved area known as Lake June-in-Winter Scrub Park, which offers unique opportunities to explore rare habitat. Bishop Park (located on the northeast portion of the lake) and Lake June Park are large public recreational areas with boat launches, public swimming, and picnic facilities.

Lake Tulane is located in the southern part of Avon Park and is a fairly deep lake with a public boat ramp on the west side. Though small at 89 acres, this lake has been estimated to be more than 50,000 years old, making it older than any other documented lake in North America. It is a prime example of a Ridge-type lake and is one of the clearest in the county with visibility extending down to 30 feet below the water's surface.



FISHING

Fishing is one of the most popular pastimes on many of our area waterbodies with great fishing year round and with peak times from November to April. The Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) manages sustainable fisheries on many of our lakes and has done habitat enhancement projects on several, including Little Red Water, Josephine, and Istokpoga. Our lakes include populations of both regulated and non-regulated species.

LARGEMOUTH BASS

A freshwater game fish in the sunfish family, which are also known as black bass, are known for the excitement of



their fight. They are structure-oriented fish, so the best places to fish for them are around cover, such as cattails, bull rush, and pads. Bass prefer a vertical presentation of bait and can be found in any lake with cover. They tend to prefer 'small creature' bait, such as crayfish imitation, 10" plastic worms, wild shiners, and top water baits. Bass are typically sport fish, which means they are caught then released while still alive. The bag limit for catching and keeping largemouth bass is five per person per day, only one of which may be 16 inches or longer in total length. There is no minimum length limit for largemouth bass.

CRAPPIE

A deep body with nearly symmetrical dorsal and anal fins, and a speckled pattern on the body and fins identify the black crappie. Unlike



most other panfish, crappies spend much of their time offshore feeding on small fish in lakes or in large, slow-moving clear water rivers. Crappie can be found in open water as they prefer deep parts of lakes, and they school together so you can often drift or troll over them. They nest from February to April, and the nests are fanned by males over gravel or muddy bottoms in depths of 3-8 feet, with big fish nesting in deeper water. Primary food items are crustaceans, aquatic insects, and small fishes. They are a cool-weather favorite and excellent table fare that are common throughout Florida. Suggested fishing methods include drifting Missouri minnows or grass shrimp below a float with a #4 hook and small split shot. The bag limit is 25 per person per day. The Florida State Record is 3.83 pounds.

BLUEGILL/SHELLCRACKER

"Bream" is a local term throughout the southeast that includes a variety of deep-bodied panfish



belonging to the sunfish family. A good eating fish that is great to fish for year round, the bluegill responds well to worms and crickets, as well as grass shrimp (not available for purchase). Use ultralight rods/cane poles. They start spawning in February/March. FWC fish sampling on Lake Istokpoga has shown good numbers of 8+ inch bluegill and redear sunfish. Anglers can concentrate their efforts from April-June around inshore and offshore cattail and bulrush stands. The thicker vegetation is difficult to fish but usually holds good numbers of large bream. In other months, productive areas to fish for bream include Big Island, Grassy Island, Bumble Bee Island, around various sandy bars, and along the edges of eelgrass. Anglers prefer crickets for bluegill and live worms for shellcracker. Fly fishing anglers can experience great action with small popping bugs. Bag limit is 50 per person per day.

WARMOUTH

Has a stout, deep body similar to other panfish. A red eye and large mouth are conspicuous field marks. Three or four dark stripes radiating back from the



eye across the cheek and gill cover like war paint confirm the identity. Warmouths inhabit swamps, marshes, shallow lakes, slow-moving streams, and canals with soft, muddy bottoms. They stay around aquatic vegetation, stumps, snags, and under the banks of streams and ponds. They have more tolerance for muddy water than most species. Warmouths are solitary nesters that prefer to nest adjacent to a submerged object. Nests are found over a wide range of water depths. They often spawn more than once a year, usually between April and August. Crayfish, shrimp, insects, and small fishes make up the bulk of their diet. Most feeding is done in the morning, as it appears to sleep at night. State Record: 2.44 pounds. Any of the same baits or lures that work well for bluegill and redear sunfish will catch warmouth.

FISHING LICENSE

Florida residents and visitors need a Florida Freshwater Fishing License unless they are a member of one of the "exempted" groups of people listed below. A fishing license is required to be on you when you attempt to take fish. If you cast your line and catch nothing, catch and release, or catch and keep and you are not a member of one of the groups listed below, you need a license. An annual freshwater fishing license is \$17.

YOU DO NOT NEED A FISHING LICENSE IF:

- · You are a child under 16 years of age.
- You are a Florida resident age 65 or older possessing proof of age and residency (a valid Florida Drivers License or Florida ID Card meets this requirement) or possessing an optional Resident Senior Citizen Hunting and Fishing Certificate.
- You are a Florida resident certified as totally and permanently disabled and you possess a Florida Resident Disabled Person Hunting and Fishing License.
- You are a resident who is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States, you are not stationed in this state, and you are home on leave for 30 days or less, upon submission of orders.

A fishing license is normally required and can be obtained at many local department and sporting goods stores, as well as the Highlands County Tax Collector's office, located at 600 S. Commerce Avenue in Sebring. We welcome you and wish you happy fishing while you are here.

KEEP GAME FISH INTACT:

Black bass, striped bass, white bass (or their hybrids), peacock bass, black crappie, and panfish (for black crappie and panfish, only in waters where minimum-length or slot-size limits for these fish apply) may not be filleted, neither their heads nor tail fins may be removed, all until the angler has completed fishing for the day.



TROPHYCATCH

TrophyCatch is an incentive-based conservation program designed for anglers who catch and release 8+ pound largemouth bass in Florida.

TrophyCatch lets you participate in one of the Florida Wildlife Commission's most innovative citizen-science conservation programs and **earn great rewards** like Bass Pro Shops gift cards! Take a scale and camera along fishing so you're ready to catch, document, and release largemouth bass eight pounds or greater!

Goals are:

- Collect valid information through citizen-science about trophy bass to help the FWC better enhance, conserve, and promote trophy bass fishing
- Encourage catch-and-release of the biggest, oldest, and most valuable bass
- Excite anglers about Florida freshwater fishing, encouraging them to purchase licenses and fish more, resulting in benefits to anglers, fishing-related businesses, local communities, and the fisheries by having more support and funding for conservation
- Share information about fishing opportunities and destinations to make fishing more enjoyable

Anglers are encouraged to follow catch-and-release guidelines for these big bass and to document the catch through a photograph of the entire bass on a scale with the weight clearly legible. See RULES and PRIZES for details.
